Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



Worship in your own way.



Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember—"one day at a time."



Let's always remember that the base for our world service is to be found in the ability and dedication of our several thousands of "G.S.R.'s." All these are the direct agents of the A.A. groups themselves. They are the indispensable linkage between our Fellowship and its global services; they are the primary representatives of A.A.'s group conscience. Without their effective support, activity, and wisdom, our basic service foundation would crumble.

How true this is can be seen in the fact that all our State and Provincial Committee Members have to be chosen from among Assemblies of G.S.R.'s, and they must be the chief agents of communication between groups and our world headquarters, and between Committee Members, Delegates and the A.A. groups themselves.

Taken as a whole, the G.S.R.'s constitute about the most important body of service that we have. Hence great care needs to be taken by the groups as they choose these, their direct representatives—a truly great responsibility.

In the long run, our edifice of world service can be no better nor more secure than the far-flung foundation of General Service Representatives upon which it really rests.

A LOOK AT A.A. 'S SERVICES

(Dave R., a Tennessee barrister, emphasizes A.A.'s unique job in helping alcoholics.)

"I'm all for committees and commissions and for cooperating with any agency whose aims will benefit the alcoholic. But I always remember that the basic operation of A.A. is one drunk talking to another.

"Our basic philosophy of working with other agencies is always cooperation, not affiliation, guided by our 6th Tradition.

Came from Experience

"It is based on long experience of trial and error and is there to guide us, not to satisfy or please anyone or any group, but for our own preservation.

"Just as in the making of whiskey, many ingredients go into the building of A.A. toward our ultimate goal. What will come out? If it is anything other than the pure product of one drunk talking to another, we put something in that didn't belong there.

One to Another

"It's important that we do not permit ourselves to get bogged down in some philosophical discussion. Who are we to talk about philosophy? Just a bunch of drunks! Because some other drunks took the time to sit down and talk to us, we are here. It didn't take learning or insight. We were drunk! Bombed! And somebody put his hand on our shoulder and said, 'I found a way out. And it's there for you, if you want it.'

"As long as G.S.O. and other A.A. services make it easy for one drunk to get to another, that's fine. That's what they are for."

What is Treasure Valley Intergroup Office of Alcoholics Anonymous Inc., What is an Intergroup Representative (IGR), and What is the TVICO Steering Committee?

Treasure Valley Intergroup Office of Alcoholics Anonymous, Inc. (Intergroup) is an Idaho Nonprofit Corporation established in 1979. The purpose of Intergroup is to:

1) foster and encourage Unity among Idaho Area 18 AA Groups and to provide for the viability of a Central Office,

2) guide the operation of the Central Office through the TVICO Steering Committee,

3) further the AA program according to the Twelve Traditions,

4)provide for a 24-Hour AA Hotline and maintain a list of volunteers to accept 12-Step calls,

5) publish a monthly newsletter to carry the message.

Intergroup membership consists of Representatives from each registered A.A. group. Each group is eligible to elect one home group member to serve as **Intergroup Representative (IGR)**. The purpose of the IGR is to:

1) attend monthly Intergroup meetings where they will have one vote to set policies and direct services,

- 2) announce Intergroup activities at the Home Group to keep the fellowship informed and foster unity through encouraging participation and volunteers as needed,
- 3) facilitate two-way communication between their Home Group and Intergroup, and
- 4) serves as the voice of the Group Conscience of their group in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole, expressing this voice to Intergroup, as an Intergroup member.

The Treasure Valley Intergroup Central Office (TVICO) is a non-profit retail store. **The TVICO Steering Committee is a sub-committee of Intergroup and is responsible and accountable to Intergroup for the day-to-day operations and management of TVICO.** The TVICO Steering Committee membership consists of one representative from each District, the Intergroup Chairperson, Intergroup Co-Chairperson, and Intergroup Treasurer. The purpose of the TVICO Steering Committee is to:

- 1)Provide goods and services to groups and individuals such as General Service Office (GSO) literature, recovery literature, answering service, and accurate meeting schedules through the operation of the TVICO retail store,
- 2) further the AA program in accordance with the Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous,
- 3) serve as an Information exchange for all AA Groups in the community, fostering AA unity,
- 4) respond to telephone inquiries from those seeking help and information regarding Alcoholics Anonymous and also answers all AA Hotline calls during normal operation hours,
- 5) develop policies and procedures for the operation and management of TVICO, as needed,
- 6) maintain complete oversight of all employment matters at TVICO,
- 7) utilize a professional Accountant to conduct audits, file tax reports, and assist the TVICO Treasurer generate a monthly cash-flow report of the store to present at the monthly Intergroup meetings,
- 8) act as a service entity "directly responsible to those they serve," as described in Tradition Nine, being mindful that the groups are atop the pyramid of A.A.. Therefore, all matters relating to potential financial burden upon the groups are presented to Intergroup for a Group Conscience before any action is taken, and
- 9) specifically excluded from the objectives of TVICO are the operations of any club, clubhouse, or drying-out place, and the endorsement of any public or private projects on alcoholism as outlined in Tradition Six.

USING AA SLOGANS TO DEALWITH HOLIDAY STRESS

Easy Does It

Happiness is not a race, and neither is recovery. In fact, any attempts to hack or crack them are likely to have the opposite effect. Happiness is achieved not in its reckless pursuit, but as a complement to other sensations and feelings of fulfillment. Recovery is much the same way, and you will get nowhere fast by attempting to speed-run it. Go easy. Take time for yourself and your recovery. Be present and mindful, and find a physical or mental space from which you draw calm energy. You are on a long journey toward happiness and fulfillment; you have to go easy or you will never get there.

First Things First

Some priorities change over time, but your sobriety should always come first. This holiday season, you might be especially tempted to move your priorities around, preferring to nail down the shopping list or hang out with family. That's completely fine, but your recovery must still come first. Remember, "Whatever you put before your sobriety, you are likely to lose." If you want to balance all your priorities and have a good sober holiday, come prepared with a list of self-care techniques that help you re-invest in long-term sobriety. Then practice them, no matter the cost, on a regular schedule and whenever you feel the need.

Live and Let Live

What a great reminder that we all do things differently, and that's okay. Maybe your uncle drives you nuts, or maybe your parents have holiday expectations or traditions that send you up a wall. Live and let live. Everyone has their own set of priorities, and everyone attempts to fulfill their needs differently. There's nothing wrong with that, so long as your sobriety isn't in danger.

Set boundaries whenever necessary, then tend to your own garden and let others tend to theirs. You should be all the calmer for it.

Keep It Simple

This holiday season, try to keep it simple. You can't do everything, and you can't meet everyone's expectations (without sacrificing your own mental health). Rather than trying to accomplish everything, simplify your sober holidays by choosing a few things that really matter to you, then fully participate in them. When things start to feel overwhelming, pare down your schedule, simplify your itinerary and hit a meeting. The holidays don't have to be complicated to be beautiful.

Take What You Like and Leave the Rest

Remember, recovery gives you the unflappable power to choose. You can slow down and choose how you spend your time, energy and money. You can embrace whichever holiday traditions you like the most, and you can celebrate whichever relationships you cherish the most. These are the things with which to fill your recovery, and these are the bonds that strengthen your sobriety. If anyone has an issue with your priorities, we have an AA slogan for them.

This Too Shall Pass

The holidays can be incredibly difficult, whether you're sober and in recovery or not. There's nothing wrong with having a hard time. The first step is always acceptance. Then do whatever you can to protect your sobriety: attend extra meetings, schedule time with sober friends and commit to regular prayer or meditation. Recovery has good days and bad, and part of recovery is how you handle the lows without resorting to alcohol. You can handle these feelings sober, and you can absolutely trust that "This too shall pass."

Keep Coming Back

Family conflict and holiday stress can produce some uncomfortable emotions, causing old patterns to bubble up from beneath the surface. If you feel self-pity, fear or resentment creeping up, hit a meeting. You don't have to face those feelings alone. In fact, the rooms of AA will be filled with familiar faces who will be navigating the holidays together.

Happily Giving

Before I came into the rooms of AA, I was absolutely clueless on what the word God meant. That's why I drank to oblivion. I had no answers to this thing called life, so I figured I might as well drink away the pain of "not knowing."

I tried to find God in so many ways. I was raised Catholic. But growing into my teens, I would party with my friends on Friday and Saturday nights, then go to communion on Sunday, be forgiven and do it all again the next week. This didn't work for me.

I became a Christian and decided that Jesus was my savior and that I was born again. I studied the bible with a beer in hand, then started questioning the treatment of the aboriginal people and their shamans. How could God send them all to hell just for not reading the Bible and for loving the earth? This didn't make sense to me. So I placed my Bible on the shelf.

I started studying Shamanism. I bought a medicine bag that I wore around my neck and decided I was going to "heal the world". What was really cool about being a shaman was that some used peyote in ceremony and if that was acceptable, surely alcohol was okay. I performed many ceremonies under the invluence. Using crystals, I would dance naked around a map of the earth, imagining I was healing the world, only to wake up hungover and unable to remember taking my clothes off!

I then decided I'd be more practical. It was the year 1999 and I started preparing for Y2K and the end of the world. I packed buckets of food and stored gas. I waited for partial law but nothing happened. I was wrong. So I kept drinking. Having tried everything to find God, I finally ended up just turning to alcohol. I slept with cans of beer on my living room floor all through the night. When I couldn't stand the pain anymore, I walked into the rooms of A.A..

It is here where I had my first real spiritual experience, when a woman gave her time to sit with me, listen to me and help me read and underline the Big Book. That experience of a human being giving time to this stinky drunk with DTs was how I found God. God loved me through her– my first sponsor.

Since then, I have found God in the rooms of AA. Some call God a "Group of Drunks", and that is true to me. I see God in others.

Christmas season is here and I'm reminded that some people have a Santa Claus God. They ask him for things and expect God to fulfill their expectations. I see this differently. I see it as giving service in AA. Giving our presence, or making coffee, or sponsoring others, or serving in a group position—all these are gifts that money can't buy. Santa Claus is a giver. That's why he's so happy all the time.

In the program, instead of asking for what we want, we learn to give what is needed of us. We become a Santa Claus God—giving the gift of sobriety to those we can help. What a bag of goodies we have to share.

What miracles we get to watch as our gifts are opened and used by newcomers who attend their first meeting. When we forget ourselves and make other people more important, we disappear into a giving that becomes selfless. In giving, we receive happiness and a very merry holiday season.





- 5. **Don't forget about regular exercise**: Regular exercise is an essential component of any balanced recovery program.
- 6. Stay away from slippery places: There is absolutely no reason to ever check out your former favorite establishments.
- 7. **Create new traditions to replace your old patterns**: Buy a new board game or take the family on a sleigh ride. Use your imagination, be creative, & have fun.
